ABOUT THE AUDIT

This report contains the results of our independent accountability audit of the Beacon Hill Sewer District.

We performed audit procedures to determine whether the District complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures. We also examined District management's accountability for public resources. Our work focused on specific areas that have potential for abuse and misuse of public resources.

Areas examined during the audit were selected using financial transactions from January 1, 2006, through December 31, 2007.

RESULTS

The District complied with state laws and regulations and its own policies and procedures in the areas we examined. Internal controls were adequate to safeguard public assets.

Description of the District

ABOUT THE DISTRICT

The Beacon Hill Sewer District was formed in 1959 to provide wastewater collection and transmission for the Beacon Hill and Columbia Heights areas of Longview and Kelso. Lexington area customers were added to the system in the early 1970's. The District served 3,070 customers in 2007 and 3,008 customers in 2006.

The District is governed by an independently elected, three-member Board of Commissioners each serving staggered, six-year terms. The Board is the District's policy and decision making authority. The Board appoints a District Manager to manage day-to-day operations of the District. During 2007, the District had seven employees. The District operated on annual revenues of \$1.6 million in 2007 and \$1.4 million in 2006.

As of January 1, 2008, the District assumed responsibility for management of water operations from Cowlitz County Public Utility District No. 1.

AUDIT HISTORY

We audit the District every two years. This audit marked the 12th consecutive year no findings were reported for the District.
